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Financial Capability Survey Shows Mississippians Ranked Worst in Having Unpaid Medical Bills, Lack of Rainy Day Savings and Financial Literacy; Tied for 2nd Worst in Making Only Minimum Credit Card Payments

WASHINGTON – The FINRA Investor Education Foundation today released the results of America’s [State-by-State Financial Capability Survey](#), which revealed that Mississippians ranked worst in having unpaid medical bills, worst in having rainy day savings and worst in financial literacy; and tied for 2nd worst in making only the minimum payment on their credit cards. The findings are part of the FINRA Foundation’s 2012 National Financial Capability Study, which explores in-depth how Americans manage their resources and make financial decisions.

The survey findings are available at www.usfinancialcapability.org, which features a clickable map of the United States and allows the public, policymakers, and researchers to delve into and compare the financial capabilities of Mississippians with residents of other states and the nation as a whole. The State-by-State Financial Capability Survey, which surveyed more than 25,000 respondents, was developed in consultation with the U.S. Department of the Treasury, other federal agencies and the President's Advisory Council on Financial Capability.

Mississippians included in the survey ranked at or near the bottom in multiple categories. Results include:

Spending vs. Saving: 37 percent of Mississippians reported spending less than their household income. The national average was 41 percent.

Unpaid Medical Bills: 41 percent of Mississippians said they had unpaid medical bills. This compares with 26 percent of respondents nationwide.

Rainy Day Funds: 64 percent of Mississippians reported not having rainy day savings to cover three months of unanticipated financial emergencies. This compares with 56 percent of Americans nationwide.

Credit Card Problems: 41 percent of Mississippians reported paying only the minimum payment during the past year, compared with 34 percent of all Americans.

Financial Knowledge: On a test of five basic financial literacy questions, Mississippians answered on average 2.53 financial literacy questions correctly. The national average was 2.88 correct answers.

“Coming out of the worst economic downturn in decades, Americans face an array of complex choices as they try to manage their day-to-day budgets and save for the future. The Great Recession put Americans’ financial capability—their ability to make intelligent financial decisions and manage risk—under a microscope. The FINRA Foundation’s Survey reveals, in unprecedented detail, the ability of Americans in every state to manage their financial lives,” said FINRA Foundation President Gerri Walsh.

The state-by-state results break down financial decisions and literacy by gender, age bracket and region, and highlight how a lack of financial capability has disadvantaged many Americans.

The State-by-State Financial Capability Survey collected data on financial behaviors across all 50 states and the District of Columbia. The FINRA Foundation will make the extensive and multi-dimensional information in this study available to policymakers and researchers, allowing them to look at individual financial behavior from various angles and utilize the state-specific data to tailor new programs and policies to promote greater financial capability.

The data were collected through an online survey of 25,509 American adults (approximately 500 per state, plus D.C.), over a four-month period, July – October 2012. The sample used in this study was weighted by age, gender, ethnicity and education. The full data set, questionnaire and methodology are available at www.usfinancialcapability.org.
